## Knitting & Crochet Guild Trustees' Annual Report For the year ended 31 March 2021

The Trustees, who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of Company Law, present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association. The minimum number of Trustees is three, there is no maximum. Trustees are elected at the annual general meeting, or appointed by existing Trustees if a vacancy arises between AGMs. The Trustees are reviewing the length of time for which Trustees may serve and will take this to the Members in due course.

Details of those who served as Trustees during the year and up to the date of signing this report are set out on page 2.

#### Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are the advancement of public knowledge and appreciation of the crafts of knitting and crochet, particularly but not exclusively through the furtherance of skill and creativity in the said crafts and the preservation of the heritage of knitting and crochet.

The charity aims to achieve its objectives by:

- Maintaining and developing the heritage Collection at Britannia Mill in Slaithwaite.
- Making the Collection available to the public and those with an interest in knitting and crochet through open days, trunk shows and the website.
- Encouraging the establishment of local groups and branches.
- Regularly publishing authoritative articles, many written by members, covering topics relevant to our crafts, including techniques and information about the Collection.
- Attending a range of craft shows to engage members of the public in the crafts of knitting and crochet and raise awareness of the Guild's unique collection of craft related garments, artefacts and publications.
- Providing a website for members, the wider craft communities and general internet users.

#### Public benefit

The Trustee directors have identified their aims, and the activities which support them, with regard to Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit.

#### Achievements and performance

The Guild has fulfilled its purpose in a variety of ways during the year.

- The continued publication of the Guild's quarterly journal, Slipknot, with authoritative articles written
  by members on techniques, special projects, and news of the Collection. During the past year, other
  publications have been launched, including a regular email newsletter and an online publication,
  "Across the Needlebed", specifically for machine knitters.
- The Guild's website and its activities on social media continued to raise awareness of the Guild.
- The branch network, where members and others meet regularly to share and develop their skills and knowledge, has continued to develop and expand.
- During the coronavirus restrictions, the Guild has maintained contact with its members via Zoom
  meetings for branches and via an online AGM and Convention ("the Un-Convention"). The latter
  included talks, workshops and demonstrations given to both members and the public. No fees were
  charged, although donations were suggested. Feedback from those who attended was very positive,
  and the number of members who attended the AGM exceeded those at previous AGMs. The
  intention is to continue to incorporate online access to the AGM.
- The Collection team resumed cataloguing the items at Britannia Mill, when restrictions allowed them
  to attend. They are currently in the process of digitising the Collection to enable easier access for
  those interested in studying the objects remotely.

#### Achievements and performance (continued)

• 100 Objects Project funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund

As reported in the 2019 accounts, the Guild was awarded a grant of £10,000 by the National Lottery Heritage Fund to increase access to the Guild's unique collection of domestically crafted knitted and crocheted items and associated artefacts (for example, tools, patterns, yarn samples). The 100 Objects project took a representative sample of 100 items from the Collection, had them professionally photographed and then released the photographs (with associated descriptions) one per day to the Guild's website and using the Guild's social media channels. The Lottery funded work was completed during the year to 31 March 2021 and, inspired by it, the Collection team are now working on further digitisation.

## Membership management system

This year, the Guild invested in an online membership management system known as Sheep. This was needed for a number of reasons, including reducing the unsustainable burden on the membership team, and replacing the previous system (GroupSpaces, now obsolete) with one that complied with GDPR and associated regulations. As part of the change, people can now pay by card or via Direct Debit. Accounts for those without online access are still managed by the membership team.

#### **Financial review**

The Trustees are pleased to report that, in spite of the difficult conditions of the pandemic, the Guild managed to finish the year with an increased surplus of £17,772 (2020: £5,031).

The main impact of the pandemic was the cancellation of the annual Convention for 2020. However, Convention itself contributes very little to the monetary results of the Guild as its base income roughly matches its costs. The Guild lost nothing from the cancellation. Our original deposit was rolled over for 2021, but when the decision was taken to cancel that Convention too, it was repaid in full. Convention also generates donations through its various activities. Some compensation for this loss was achieved through the generosity of those members who donated some or all of their deposits to the Guild. Our substitute for Convention, which was mentioned above, cost a total of £801: a small price for something that generated so much positivity and raised our profile, resulting in new members. It also provided a range of much needed resources (including videos) for the Guild.

Subscription income grew by 43% reflecting the merger with the Guild of Machine Knitters and the Trustees were grateful to receive a legacy of over £16,500 from a former member.

The Guild's unrestricted expenditure fell by over 50% in the year, which is explained by the absence of Convention, lack of physical shows and exhibitions for the Guild to attend, and a reduction in Governance expenditure as meetings moved online. Some of these savings will be repeated in 2021-2022. Our quarterly journal, *Slipknot*, remains one of our main areas of expenditure, but these costs fell very slightly this year as some members have opted to access it online. Because the content and editing of the magazine are provided entirely by volunteers, it continues to provide excellent value for money.

The Trustees once again acknowledge that the Guild would be unable to operate without the goodwill, energy and enthusiasm of its volunteers, whose commitment enables the Guild to meet its objectives. As the pandemic loosens its grip, the Trustees encourage more members to volunteer: even something as simple as spreading the word about the Guild can cumulatively make a huge difference.

#### Policy on reserves

At 31st March 2021 the Guild had unrestricted funds of £104,886 (2020 £82,568) of which £23,251 (2020: £24,500) related to fixed assets and is not readily available. This leaves free funds of £81,635 (2020: £58,068). The Guild has a moral obligation to ensure that monies raised by the Collection are used for the further development of the Collection: at 31st March 2021 these funds amounted to £22,664 (2020: £24,111). Funds available for general purposes therefore amount to £58,971 (2020: £33,957).

#### Policy on reserves (continued)

The Trustees have assessed that the minimum they require as free funds is £30,000 to meet the charity's commitments and ensure an orderly winding up of the Guild should this be necessary. They will continue to explore ways to increasing the level of funds received, with excess funds being used for the development of the Guild and its activities.

#### **Future events**

At the start of 2021-2022 the United Kingdom was once again in lockdown due to the pandemic. As a result the annual Convention will once again take place virtually. However, it is clear that some groups are beginning to meet again physically as well as virtually and the Collection team are beginning to return to Britannia Mill less cautiously. Future planning has to place personal safety at its heart, but the future can now be faced more optimistically.

#### Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also Directors of the Knitting & Crochet Guild for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.)

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charity, and the income and expenditure of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011 and the provisions of the Articles of Association. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## 1 Accounting policies

#### a. Basis of preparation.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the Charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011, and the SORP (FRS 102) Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard (FRS 102) applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

#### b. Going concern

The Trustees have considered the requirements to comment on the going concern status of the charity and confirm that resources are sufficient to continue operations for the foreseeable future.

## c. Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees, in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for a particular purpose. Restricted funds are amounts which must only be applied to the purpose for which they were given.

#### d. Income

Income is recognised in the statement of financial activities (SOFA) when the Guild has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income and the costs incurred for the transaction can be measured reliably.

Subscription income is recognised in the financial year to which it relates.

Legacy income is recognised when the Guild becomes entitled to a legacy, when its receipt is probable and the amount receivable is measurable either through probate estimates or receipt.

Income received in advance of an event or the provision of goods or services is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

#### e. Expenditure

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation. Expenditure includes VAT which is not recoverable.

Costs of raising funds are those costs incurred in attracting income other than that which relates to the Guilds objectives

Costs of charitable activities are costs that arise from the pursuance of the charitable objectives, including the maintenance of the Collection. The Guild has adopted the natural classification of costs rather than an activity basis by virtue of its small size.

#### f. Leased assets

Rentals applicable to operating leases are expensed over the life of the lease on a straight line basis. (See Note 6 below)

#### g. Intangible assets

Intangible assets are recognised in the financial statements if and only if it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity; and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

The Trustees are satisfied that, in respect of the website and the database, which are included in the financial statements at their acquisition cost, anticipated future economic benefits justify capitalisation. Intangible assets are amortised over their estimated productive life, from the time they are brought into use. In the case of both the website and the database the life is believed to be 3 years.

#### h. Heritage assets

The charity's heritage assets consist of its collection of craft related goods and equipment, its documents collection and library. When it incorporated, the charity already had large collections and a library. Since then these have been added to by items purchased by the charity and also by donations of goods and equipment.

## 1 Accounting policies (continued)

## h. Heritage assets (continued)

The assets introduced into the charity in 2005 and donated since then have not been included in the financial statements because the Trustees consider that there is no practical way to value the collections and library, due to their specialist nature and there is no reasonable method to establish what donations were worth on the open market. They also consider that, given the nature of the assets, there is little likelihood that the value of the items purchased has been reduced and so no depreciation charge has been made.

The amount shown in the accounts represents the purchases which have been made since the charity was incorporated in 2005.

#### i. Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing more than £250 are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over the estimated useful economic life of the asset, from the time it is brought into use, as follows:

- equipment 3 years
- leasehold property over the term of the lease

## j. Branches

The charity has a number of branches where members meet to discuss and learn craft-related skills. The branches arrange their own venues and programmes for which they collect contributions. The Trustees exercise no control over the branches and the branches are not required to submit accounts to the charity, therefore, their transactions are not included in these accounts except where there is a direct payment into or out of charity funds.

## Independent Examiner's report To the Trustees of the Knitting & Crochet Guild ('the Company')

I report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 March 2021 which are set out on pages 6-14.

## Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The Trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

### **Basis of Independent Examiner's report**

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from you as Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a "true and fair view" and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

  - to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records, comply with the accounting requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and which are consistent with the methods and principles of the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities, have not been met; or
- to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.
